From Father Raning

An old soldier, blind and paralysed, lay in his bed at the Veterans' Hospital. He'd been there a long time, sad and lonely, and now he had yet another roommate. Unlike the grouches who had gone before, the new man seemed jolly and friendly. So the old soldier asked the new man, whose bed was by the window, to tell him what was going on outside. The man responded with gusto. He described the flowers bursting into bloom, the birds hopping across the lawn, the postman making his rounds, the children riding their bikes, and much more.

It became a daily ritual, the man by the window helping the blind soldier connect with the wonderful world outside. But one day the man by the window died, and his bed was taken by a new man. With some trepidation the soldier asked him, "Would you describe what's going on outside our window." The new man looked out the window, paused awhile and then said, "I don't know what good it'll do. There's nothing outside this window but a blank wall."

Nothing there! Nothing but a blank wall! Msgr. Dennis Clark reflected, "That's the fear that eventually haunts every heart, the fear that we're boxed in by the blank walls of our mortality: we're born, we live, we die, and there is no escape. Just nothing, forever and ever." But it's not the truth. The old soldier by the window knew that in his heart. "There's more," whispered his heart.

Our hearts are whispering the same words, "There's more than we can see right now, much, much more on the other side of the wall. We are not made for nothingness."

Now, God himself speaks to us out loud — not in words but in mighty deeds: He has raised Jesus from the dead. And in doing that he is saying to us, "You can trust that whisper in your heart: Life is what I made you for. Not death, but life. Life with me forever!"

That is God's promise to us this Easter morning: To live with him forever!

Upgrades to our parish buildings

You may have noticed this past week a lot of vans, utes and workers within our parish grounds. Why all this activity? In wonderful news we are installing ducted air conditioning into the Father David Scott Parish Centre, and in addition, installing security cameras and equipment within the Church and grounds. Until all relevant work is completed, the Parish Centre will remain unavailable until further notice. The installation of air conditioning and security was only possible following our successful applications for community grants. Without this funding, our parish would not have been able to afford these important projects. Both grants are Commonwealth projects/ schemes being the Community Building Partnerships Grant and Stronger Communities Programme.

Reminder about Sunday obligation

On 20 March 2020 Catholics from the Diocese of Parramatta were dispensed from their Sunday Mass obligation until further notice (Canon 1248 §2 and Catechism 2181) by virtue of a Decree issued by Bishop Vincent Long Van Nguyen OFM Conv. This Decree is now revoked and Sunday obligation is now imposed once again given that public health orders no longer require adherence to density limits in our church buildings. Veiling Crosses and Statues in Holy Week

Every year in the period leading up to Easter, you will notice our Crucifixes and statues are covered in a purple shroud. This has been the practice for some time, however up until recent years in our parish only the Crucifixes were covered. In general terms, crosses are removed or veiled if possible so that the focus of the Adoration of the Holy Cross at the celebration of the Passion of the Lord is the one cross which is processed and unveiled. The cross is the central symbol of Holy Week. In the past the cross was unveiled for veneration on Good Friday and statues were uncovered during the Glory to God at the Easter Vigil. After the Second Vatican Council there were moves to abolish the custom altogether but it has survived, and the Bishops' Conference of each country can decide whether to make the custom obligatory in its territory.
