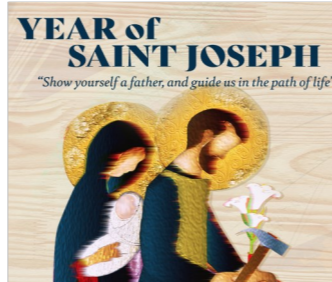

Holy Days of Obligation in Australia

The Australian Catholic Bishops' Conference determined that, in addition to all the Sundays in the year, the only feast days to be observed in Australia as holy days of obligation are the solemnities of the Nativity of Our Lord Jesus Christ (December 25th) and the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. (August 15th). Moreover, these two holy days of obligation are to be observed annually, regardless of the day of the week on which they fall.

All Saints' Day (November 1st) and All Souls' Day (November 2nd)

All Saints' Day commemorates all the saints in heaven. The feast dates back to the early Church, when communities would gather and celebrate the anniversary of the martyr's death. During the persecution under emperor Diocletian at the beginning of the fourth century the number of martyrs became so great that a separate day could not be assigned to each saint, so the Church established a common feast day for all the martyrs. The feast took on such importance in the life of the Church that from the beginning it was celebrated with a vigil and, from the time of Pope Sixtus IV (1471-84), with an octave. The liturgical celebration on the day before the feast became known as hallowed evening or Hallowe'en. All Saints Day represents the desire of the faithful to commemorate all saints, 'great multitude which no man could number' (Rev 7:9), especially those who have no proper feast day of their own. All Saints' Day is a time to consider the example saints offer us and to reflect on how we can imitate their lives. As Pope Benedict XVI said, All Saints' Day calls us 'to see the Church... as Christ wanted it, that is, as the communion of saints.'

All Souls' Day is also known as the Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed and the Day of the Dead. A day of prayer and remembrance for souls of those who have died. Believers remember, pray and offer Mass for the souls in Purgatory, that they may be purified and attain the Beatific Vision. Believers pray for the souls which, on departing from the body are not perfectly cleansed from venial sins, or not fully atoned for past transgressions, and not yet able to be granted the Beatific Vision of with God in Heaven. The idea is that living faithful can help them with prayers, almsgiving and especially Sacrifice of the Mass. Between 998 and 1030, St Odilo of Cluny ordered the commemoration of the faithful departed on 2 November in all of the monasteries of his Benedictine congregation. From there, it spread among the other congregations of the Benedictines and among the Carthusians over the next two centuries. Soon afterwards, the commemoration of all the Holy Souls in Purgatory spread to the entire Church from the diocese of Liege under Bishop Notger in the ninth century. The day is dedicated to prayer and remembrance, with requiem Masses commonly held.

Month Of The Holy Souls—The November Scroll

The November Scroll for the Holy Souls will be placed on the Altar as has been our custom. All Masses offered during November will be for the souls named on the scroll. If you would like to include your deceased family members and friends, please use the November envelopes which you will find at the back of the Church. These may be placed in the second collection.

Divine Mercy Chaplet every Friday afternoon

Commencing this Friday, we are resuming our Divine Mercy Chaplet. Everyone is welcome to attend and join in solemn and intimate prayer. The Divine Mercy Chaplet is held every Friday 3:30pm in the Marian Chapel and no booking is required.

The Church is now open—some important points and reminders

- Bookings are required ONLY for Weekend Masses. To book please phone the office 9:00am to 1:00pm Mon, Wed and Thur.
- The Church is open every day for personal prayer.
- Upon arrival at the Church you will always need to sign in, sanitise and sit according to social distancing requirements.
- Masks are required inside the Church at all times, whether it be for Mass or personal visit.
- Our Masses will also continue to be livestreamed on Facebook.
- Reconciliation is available and is held on Saturday and be available from 4:00pm to 4:45pm
- There are no entry requirements based upon your vaccination status – the Church is open to everyone.
