

From Father Raining

With the coming of each New Year is the realisation that there are some things in life we have in common: We're all getting older. And all through the year, there's no shortage of reminders of that reality, eg,

- At twenty-five years of age, we didn't care what the world thought of us; at thirty, we started to worry about what the world thought of us.
- At forty, we realised that the world wasn't thinking about us at all. We know we're getting older when we try to straighten our socks only to find that we can't reach them.
- At fifty we stop patting ourselves on the back and start patting ourselves under the chin.
- We know we are getting older when we need to put in our teeth and our hearing aid before we can ask where we left our eyeglasses.

Whether you're twenty-five, fifty-five or one hundred and five, the Good News is all wrapped up in a simple phrase, consisting of only two words, to be used in a certain context. The two words are "Please God ..." -- not in the sense of, "Please God, grant me this or that and it will make me happy," but "My happiness depends absolutely on my willingness to please God."

Luke tells us when Jesus was baptised "Heaven opened and the Holy Spirit descended on Him in bodily shape, like a dove. And a voice came from Heaven, "You are My Son, the Beloved; My favour rests on You" (Lk. 3:21-22). Some earlier translations say, "This is My Beloved Son in whom I am well pleased."

Jesus was pleasing the Father because He was doing His Will. Jesus was placing his Father's Will at the centre of His life. Jesus' lifestyle was in harmony with God's Will. "Let it be as You, not I would have it" was His abiding prayer to the Father: "Thy Will be done!"

First Reading: At his baptism, God calls Jesus a "beloved Son."

How can I thank God for making me a beloved child, too?

Second Reading: Isaiah tells us that God is like a shepherd who gathers the lambs in his arms.

What part of my life shall I entrust to God's strong arms?

Gospel: Luke tells us the people were filled with expectation for the coming of the Messiah.

What fills my heart with expectations today?

Nothing Ordinary about Ordinary Time

Ordinary Time (colour Green) commences this week. During the season between Christmas and Lent, the readings focus on Jesus' early ministry of teaching, and healing, and the gathering of disciples. Shrove Tuesday celebrations often mark the end of this season. Ordinary Time resumes later in the year. The word "ordinary" in Ordinary Time comes from the word ordinal. "Counted Time" would be a better translation. The occurrence of Easter determines the length of this counted time. Easter falls on the 1st Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox. The timing falls between March 22 and April 25. The Sundays and weeks of Ordinary Time are days of growth and harvest -- days of hope and time to mature in one's faith. Green is the colour of ongoing life in nature: the renewal of spring grass, flowers and trees. Green signifies hope and growth. The green weeks, 1 to 34, provide time to be refreshed with the Sunday Scriptures, sequentially following the life and works of Jesus in his public ministry. The longest liturgical season is that of the weeks following Easter. The last Sunday of the liturgical year is the celebration of the Feast of Christ the King.

Mass will stay on television for 2022

The Diocese of Wollongong, which took over production of Mass for You at Home in early 2021, recently confirmed the plan to ensure the ministry remains on free-to-air television, as well as being accessible online. Last year the ministry marked 50 years on Australian television, supporting the housebound, those in prison or in hospital, those in remote Australia and who for other reasons could not attend Mass in their local parish. It is believed to be the longest-running program on Australian commercial television. Mass for You at Home airs each Sunday on Channel 10 at 6am, on Aurora (Foxtel Channel 173) at 10am, and on the web from 7am.
