

## Saint Matthias the Apostle (May 14th)

Matthias, whose name means "gift of God", was the disciple chosen to replace Judas as one of the twelve. The Acts of the Apostles state that he was also one of the 72 disciples that Jesus sent out to preach the good news. Matthias was with the Lord since His Baptism, and remained until His Ascension. He is said to have met his death by crucifixion in Colchis or by stoning in Jerusalem. There is evidence cited in some of the early Church fathers that there was a Gospel according to Matthias in circulation, but it has since been lost, and was declared apocryphal by Pope Gelasius. He is invoked for assistance against alcoholism, and for support by recovering alcoholics.

## Our Lady of Fatima (May 13th)

Between May 13 and October 13, 1917, three Portuguese children - Francisco and Jacinta Marto and their cousin Lucia dos Santos - received apparitions of Our Lady at Cova da Iria near Fatima. Mary asked the children to pray the rosary for world peace, for the end of World War I, for sinners, and for the conversion of Russia. Mary gave the children three secrets. Following the deaths of Francisco and Jacinta in 1919 and 1920 respectively, Lucia revealed the first secret in 1927. It concerned devotion to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The second secret was a vision of hell. When Lucia grew up she became a Carmelite nun and died in 2005 at the age of 97. Pope John Paul II directed the Holy See's Secretary of State to reveal the third secret in 2000; it spoke of a "bishop in white" who was shot by a group of soldiers who fired bullets and arrows into him. Many people linked this vision to the assassination attempt against Pope John Paul II. Mary is perfectly honoured when people generously imitate her response "Let it be done to me as you say" (Luke 1:38).
