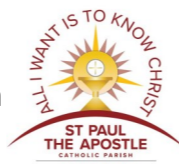

## Catholic Church celebrates Social Justice Sunday: 28<sup>th</sup> August

The Australian Catholic Church celebrates Social Justice Sunday on 28 August. It is a special day to engage with the Australian Bishops' new Social Justice Statement for 2022-23: *Respect: Confronting Violence and Abuse*. The statement invites us to engage with a complex and confronting social reality. It explores the roots of domestic and family violence and abuse, honours the voices of victims, offers a social and theological exploration of the reality of violence, especially against women and children, and invites us to develop relationships in all parts of our lives "marked by equality and reciprocity rather than domination and violence, respect and freedom rather than coercion and control." The Australian Bishops call for all people to take part in the individual and social transformation needed so all people can live in safety. ## Feast Days this week

29<sup>th</sup> August *The Passion of Saint John the Baptist*

The Church, having celebrated the earthly birthday of St. John the Baptist on June 24, today honours the anniversary of his martyrdom. Besides our Lord and our Lady, St. John the Baptist is the only one whose birth and death are thus celebrated. He had the courage to blame Herod to his face for the scandal of his illegal union with his sister-in-law Herodias, whose husband was still alive. Herodias contrived to make Herod imprison him to take advantage of an opportunity to (obtain through her daughter Salome) behead the saint.

2<sup>nd</sup> September *Ember Day*

Ember Days corresponded roughly with the beginning of each of the four seasons. The second Vatican Council retained Ember Days in principle and the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference decided that the Australian Church should observe the first Fridays in Autumn and Spring each year as special days of prayer and penance. It is a great way of acknowledging the abundance we often take for granted, thanking God for it, and consciously striving to live virtuously instead of simply as consumers. Pope Francis has encouraged us to take up a new asceticism, where we 'replace consumption with sacrifice, greed with generosity, wastefulness with a spirit of sharing'.

3<sup>rd</sup> September *Saint Gregory the Great*

Gregory was the prefect of Rome before he was 30 and after five years in office he resigned, founded six monasteries on his Sicilian estate, and became a Benedictine monk. He was content to be a monk, but willingly served the Church in other ways when asked. He sacrificed his own preferences in many ways, especially when called to be Bishop of Rome. Ordained a priest, Gregory became one of the pope's seven deacons. At the age of 50 was elected pope by the clergy and people of Rome. Gregory was direct and firm. He removed unworthy priests from office, forbade taking money for many services, emptied the papal treasury to ransom prisoners and to care for persecuted Jews and the victims of plague and famine. He was very concerned about the conversion of England, sending 40 monks from his own monastery. He is known for his reform of the liturgy, and for strengthening respect for doctrine. Called "the Great," Gregory has been given a place with Augustine, Ambrose, and Jerome, as one of the four key doctors of the Western Church. An Anglican historian has written: "It is impossible to conceive what would have been the confusion, the lawlessness, the chaotic state of the Middle Ages without the medieval papacy; and of the medieval papacy, the real father is Gregory the Great."

## From Father Raining

As we gather around the table of the Lord, we're all sinners in need of salvation, beggars needing bread. We are "the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind." Maybe not literally poor, crippled, lame, and blind, but spiritually poor, crippled, lame, and blind. Yet God graciously includes us as guests at His Table. Good communion table manners include coming to the table without thinking too much of ourselves. And, finally, good communion table manners include coming without looking down on any other guest, for all of us are God's equally beloved guests.

King George IV desired Communion and sent a servant to bring the Bishop of Winchester. When the servant arrived with the Bishop, the King was angry. He felt his servant had taken too long. The King upbraided the man and fired him on the spot. Having done that, he turned to the Bishop for Communion. But the Bishop refused to proceed. He saw that the King was still angry. Realising the Bishop was right, the King called for his servant, apologised, and restored the man's job. Only then could Communion proceed.

Part of good table manners is extending graciousness to the other guests.

As we have been forgiven and welcomed by God, let us forgive and welcome each other.

First Reading: Sirach encourages us to be content with our limits; strive to act humbly instead of arrogantly.  
*What tends to make me think more of myself and act in a haughty way toward others?*

Second Reading: God no longer appears amidst the fire, thunder, and great signs as on Mt. Sinai.  
*What gentle (or not so gentle) signs has God used to get my attention?*

Gospel: Jesus urges us to break out of our circle of friends to help those who might be neglected.  
*How can I reach out to help the poor, the sick, or the lonely who cannot repay me?*
