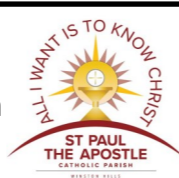

From Father Raining

John Newton, wrote the hymn Amazing Grace in 1779. He identified himself with the prodigal son, the son who wasted his inheritance. As a young man he left home and went to sea and there lived wildly and free.

Like many people who abandon God, he was highly critical of the Christian faith, and spent much time tearing down the faith of the people he met as he went from place to place. It was only in later years that he realised that he had wasted his young life, and indeed not only wasted it - but in all that time he had been offensive to God and to all God-fearing people. And like the young prodigal, he repented and sought, in humility and submissiveness, to serve God for the rest of his days.

His experience of God's forgiveness, of God's grace, is not only described well in the emotion packed words of the song he wrote, it is also to be found in his epitaph he himself wrote shortly before his death in 1807. He describes himself and his experience of God this way: "John Newton, clerk, once an infidel and libertine, was by the rich mercy of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ, preserved, restored, pardoned, and appointed to preach the faith he had long laboured to destroy."

To what do I give my attention that lures me away from God?

Second Reading: Paul knows that he has been treated mercifully despite his sinfulness.
How have I shown mercy to others as God did to Paul?

Gospel: Jesus searches out those who are lost and need help.
How can I be part of finding and helping those who are lost and in need of help today?

Feast Days this week

12th The Most Holy Name of Mary, 13th Saint John Chrysostom, 14th The Exaltation of the Holy Cross, 15th Our Lady of Sorrows, 16th Saints Cornelius and Cyprian, 17th Saint Robert Bellarmine, Saint Hildegard of Bingen.

September is dedicated to Our Lady of Sorrows. The Memorial of Our Lady of Sorrows falls on the 15th because the day before is the Feast of the Triumph of the Cross; tied to an event in the life of her Son. On the 14th, we celebrate the instrument of Christ's victory over death; and the next day, we remember the suffering of Mary as she stood at the foot of the Cross and witnessed the torture and death of her Son. This suffering was not limited to the passion and death event; rather, it comprised the seven dolours or seven sorrows of Mary, which were foretold by the Priest Simeon who proclaimed to Mary: this child [Jesus] is destined to be the downfall and the rise of many in Israel, a sign that will be opposed and you yourself shall be pierced with a sword so that the thoughts of many hearts may be laid bare (Luke 2:34-35). These seven sorrows of our Blessed Mother included the flight of the Holy Family into Egypt; the loss and finding of the child Jesus in the Temple; Mary's meeting of Jesus on His way to Calvary; Mary's standing at the foot of the cross when our Lord was crucified; her holding of Jesus when He was taken down from the cross; and then our Lord's burial. For this reason, Mary is sometimes depicted with her heart exposed and with seven swords piercing it. More importantly, each new suffering was received with the courage, love, and trust that echoed her fiat, *let it be done unto me according to Thy word*, first uttered at the Annunciation. Through these prayers for September, we can unite ourselves to Mary in her sorrow, in the hope that we will one day also share her joy in the triumph of her Son.
